It was with somewhat disbelief followed by amusement, that I heard that The Vines management stated at their meeting, that an offer had not been received.

I am not going to debate what amounts to an offer, a contract or an expression of interest, but I will say that if correspondence from company "A" (let's call them the purchasers) is delivered to company "B" (let's call them the seller) expresses a desire to purchase the club as it stands and provides details of a specific dollar amount to cover this purchase, most people would consider this to be an expression of interest.

Finally, I would like to thank you all for attending the VRA meeting at the Ellenbrook Christian College. Those people that attended our previous meetings would be aware that a bigger venue was needed. We acknowledge that with the very hot weather and the requirement to wear a mask that it was not the most comfortable of meetings. However, we believe it is very important to keep you as residents up to date and to be available to answer all your questions.

With the uncertainty of what COVID will bring to this State during the next few months and the fact that we need to plan to accommodate 300 plus attendees at our meetings, it may be necessary to do things differently in the coming months. We welcome your feedback on how we might be able to do things differently and whether more suitable venues are available.

Safety

In January the police attended The Vines on thirteen occasions including:

- Seven (7) Noise complaints
- Two (2) Disturbances
- Two (2) Traffic Breaches
- One (1) Traffic Crash
- One (1) Assault

There was a big increase in police attendance jobs in The Vines during the month of January. Most were related to noise complaints and disturbances. This is possibly due to the warmer weather with more outdoor activity occurring.

The additional link roads through The Vines to Annies Landing and North Ellenbrook have resulted in a steady increase in traffic related incidents. This is illustrated by the traffic accident on the corner of Bordeaux Lane and Vines Avenue and two (2) separate traffic breaches.

Please make sure you report traffic and hoon related behaviour to police. The more complaints that are received the greater the chance for the allocation of additional traffic patrols.

Environmental Matters

Quenda

One of the most popular animals in our recent photo competition was the Quenda, a sub-species of the Southern Brown Bandicoot.

Quenda weigh up to 1.5kg and grow to 35cm in length. They are very stocky, with a long pointed nose and small round ears.

They prefer dense understorey, banksia and jarrah woodlands, which includes gardens with areas of native shrubs and untrimmed grass trees that provide great habitat. The Vines currently has a healthy Quenda population - which is very special, as they are currently classified 'Near Threatened.' Quendas need space - their territories range from 2-6 hectares – one of the many reasons that the golf course fairways and rough are absolutely essential – they provide crucial habitat and form the corridors between gardens and remnant bush. More housing will create barriers, fracturing the environment into a mosaic of small patches too small to sustain life and will rapidly destroy our Quenda population.

(It's not just food either, Quendas need to be able to meet other Quendas!) They are a gardener's friend (mostly!), as they love bugs, tubers, and fungi. They may also dig small, conical holes in your garden, including the lawn, to get bugs out. (Any big holes – it's a rabbit) Whilst they normally go looking for food at night, they are active at dusk, and we are occasionally lucky to see one taking advantage of spilled parrot seeds.

Quendas are great ecosystem engineers who are looking after the long-term health of remnant patches of suburban bushland. By digging (and turning over nearly 4 tonnes of soil a year!) for food, quenda are helping the environment. They breakdown soil organic matter, help water infiltrate into the soil, facilitate nutrient cycling, aerate the soil and assist seed germination.

All good reasons for helping to keep our quendas healthy!

Wine Within The Swan Valley

Start the Presses ...

The sound of crushers and presses working at Swan Valley Wineries has hailed the start of Vintage 2022.

This year's vintage (wine grape harvest) started in mid-January. A wet winter and mild spring saw the grapes develop slower than most years, but intense heat in mid-December and January have seen the usual ripening cycle back on schedule.

Chardonnay for sparkling wine production is one of the first crops harvested followed by the white wine varieties of Verdelho, Chenin Blanc and Semillon. Depending of the weather, late February or March will see the harvesting of the red wine grapes, Shiraz, Grenache, Petit Verdot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Tempranillo and Malbec. Late March and April will see the final pick of grapes for the season. These grapes are used to make the Swan Valleys luscious fortified wines, Pedro Ximenez and Muscat.

Warm vintage seasons result in grapes with bold and full flavour, some winemakers tend to take the fruit off the vine slightly early in warm years to retain as much acidity and freshness as possible. Selective canopy management and scientific water monitoring ensure crops remain in excellent condition to harvest.

The next few months will see many tonnes of grapes from the Swan Valley and fruit brought in from other regions crushed, resulting in plenty of long hours processing fruit and fermenting wines. For a winemaker, it's the most exciting time of the year - hard work but very rewarding



While it is too early to call, all the signs point to an excellent Swan Valley vintage in both quality and quantity.
